
# ASAKUSABASH ENERYthing's Real (Feel, touch, eat!) in Taito City.

The Asakusabashi area has been thriving since the Edo period as a commercial and transportation center by harnessing the natural wealth of the Sumida River. The Tokugawa Shogunate built a gate here called "Asakusa-Mitsuke," a crucial advance guard for the defense of Edo Castle.

Today, with its dense commercial community composed of various wholesalers and retailers, such as traditional doll shops, Asakusabashi attracts numerous visitors.

### Edo Dori (Edo Street) Shopping Area 江戸通りショッピングエリア








Many interesting shops line Edo Dori. In particular, Japanese doll specialty stores catch visitors' eyes, especially in the area surrounding Asakusabashi Station. Inside the shops, guests will be entranced by a wide selection of beautiful dolls dressed in kimonos. Handicraft shops are also very popular due to their low-price offerings and range of intricate goods such as embroidery beads. Overseas visitors should also stop by the

stationary and grocery shops that line the street since the inexpensive, Japanese-style novelties and commodities that can be found there could make an excellent souvenir.

## Edo-Tokyo Museum 江戸東京博物館



With a population of 1.3 million, Edo, the former name of Tokyo, was the world's largest and most prosperous city during the 18th century. The efficient urban infrastructure that was established at that time included water supply, a traffic network leveraging waterways, and a plan for maintaining security. The exhibits of the Edo-Tokyo Museum reveal the history of the city and the life and culture of the people who lived there.

#### Sumo Museum 相撲博物館



Sumo wrestling tournaments are held six times a year, three of which are at the Kokugikan in Ryogoku, Tokyo. Even during the off-season, the Sumo Museum housed inside the Kokugikan exhibits Sumorelated articles to introduce this national sport.

#### Riverside Scenery 川辺の風景



Along the periphery of the Kanda River, many shipping houses called Funayado operate year round fleets of Yakatabune, old-fashioned Japanese houseboats for excursions around the Tokyo waterfront.

Guests can enjoy a cruise against a backdrop of a beautiful night view of the metropolis while dining on Japanese cuisine.

## **Taito City Loop Bus "Megurin"**

Taito City provides public transportation service by operating a fleet of buses called "Megurin." Linking major spots such as Asakusa and Ueno Station in one direction, Megurin come every 15 minutes on the north, south, east-west, and north-south routes.

The fare is JPY 100 each way for both adults and children.

Other boarding tickets such as bus cards are not honored.

A one day travel card costs JPY 300.


