Access Map

A wide range of rail and city bus lines, including JR and subway lines, serve Koto. It's easy to reach Koto from terminal stations such as Tokyo Station, as well as from sightseeing destinations like Asakusa, the Imperial Palace, and Tokyo Skytree Town®. Bus service from sightseeing spots located further away from train stations ensures getting around is convenient. Sightseeing shuttle bus service connecting the coastal area with the Fukagawa and Joto areas (the Fukagawa Shuttle and Joto Shuttle) is available on Saturdays, Sundays, and public holidays. Sumida River and various canals also provide convenient access from Odaiba and Asakusa, and regular water bus service is available. Shuttle bus service to Tokyo International Airport (Haneda Airport) and Narita International Airport is available from Toyosu and Toyochi.

Useful Information

Using Public Transportation

You can purchase train tickets from ticket machines at any station. They are used both to enter and leave the station via automatic ticket gates. Bus fares are paid when boarding by placing cash in the fare slot on the bus. Travel by both train and bus can be made more convenient by purchasing an IC card, which can then be used to pay for fares. In addition, one-day passes are a convenient and reasonably priced way to explore the city. One-day rail passes can be purchased at ticket machines at train stations, while one-day bus passes can be purchased on municipal buses.

ATM

ATMs at post offices and convenience stores (such as 7-Eleven) are a handy way to get cash. Some credit cards issued outside Japan can also be used to withdraw cash in Japanese yen. Note that daily withdrawal limits, service hours, and fees vary by card. <http://www.sevenbank.co.jp/english/>

Community Cycles

Expand your sphere of activities by using the Community Cycle bike sharing service to explore Koto in a fun and efficient way. Bicycles feature power assist technology. Since they can be rented and returned freely at any of the many cycle ports located in the service's coverage area, which extends to sightseeing destinations throughout the coastal region, riders can enjoy every corner of the city. 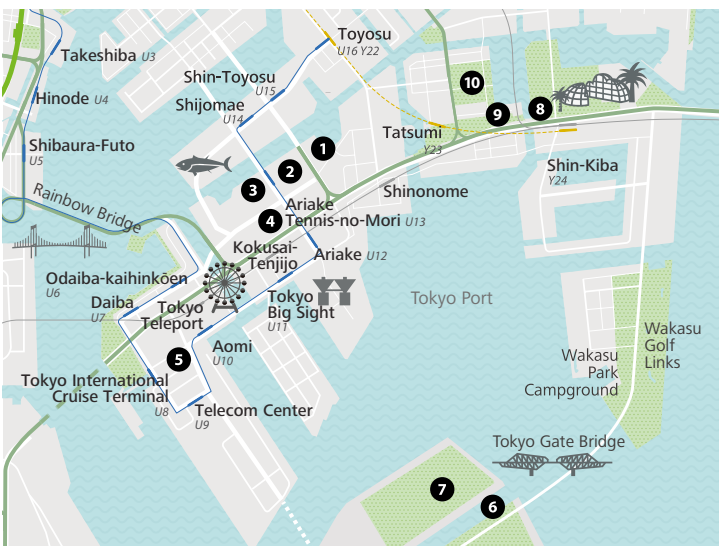
Waterfront scenery with rich natural beauty

Map of Tokyo 2020 Olympic and Paralympic Games

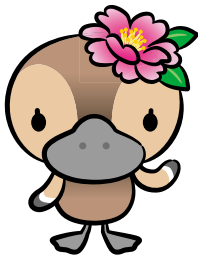

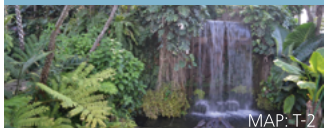


1 Tokyo Gate Bridge
This enormous bridge, measuring 2,618 meters in length and spanning across the Port of Tokyo, is open to pedestrians during the day. It's also lit daily from sunset until midnight, making it a great spot from which to enjoy nighttime scenery of the bay.

4 Yumenoshima Tropical Greenhouse Dome
This botanical museum is located inside Yumenoshima Park. Filled with tropical and subtropical plants, the gigantic greenhouse resembles a jungle! The museum also has a theatre and an exhibition hall. <http://www.yumenoshima.jp/>

3 Nakagawa Funabansho Museum
This museum specializes in the history of water transport, which was used to carry cargo from the city's rivers to the larger Kanto region and other destinations nationwide. A diorama recreates the Nakagawa Lookout on the Onagi River from which boat traffic to and from the city of Edo was monitored and controlled. <http://www.kcf.or.jp/nakagawa/>

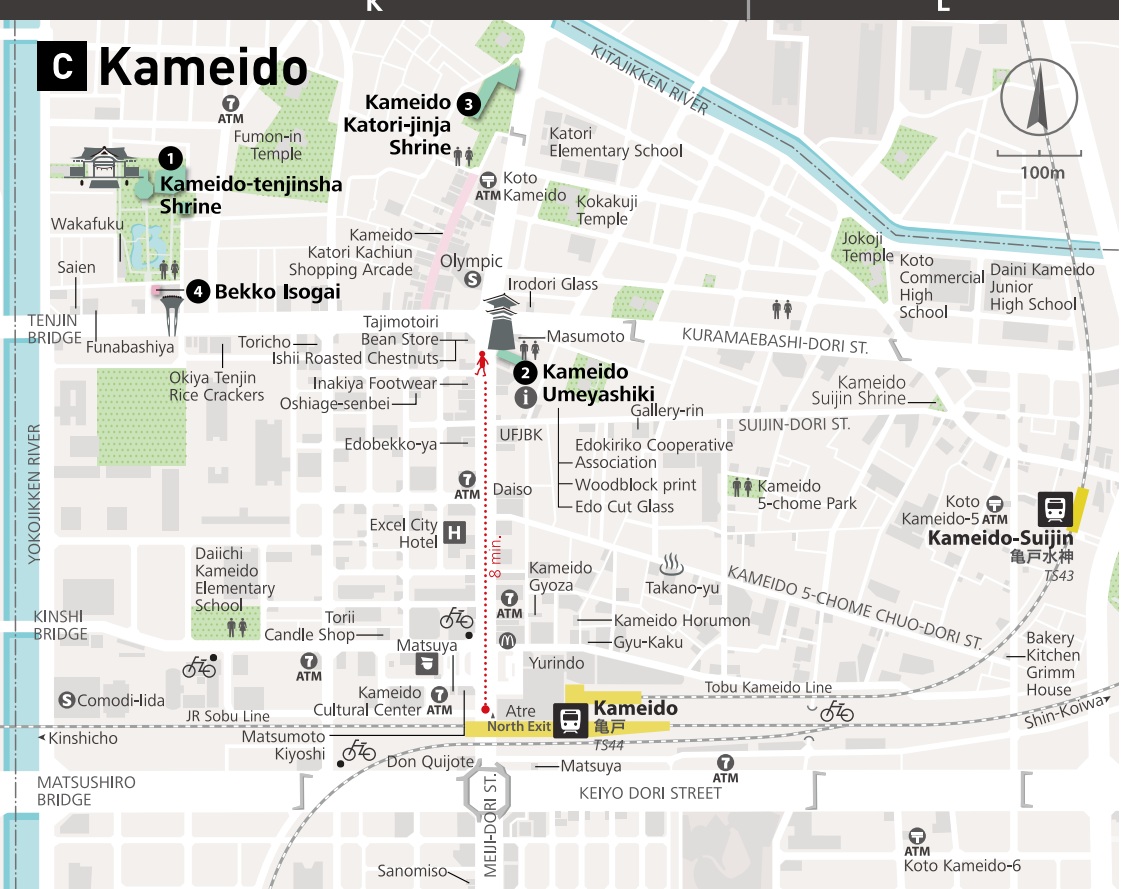
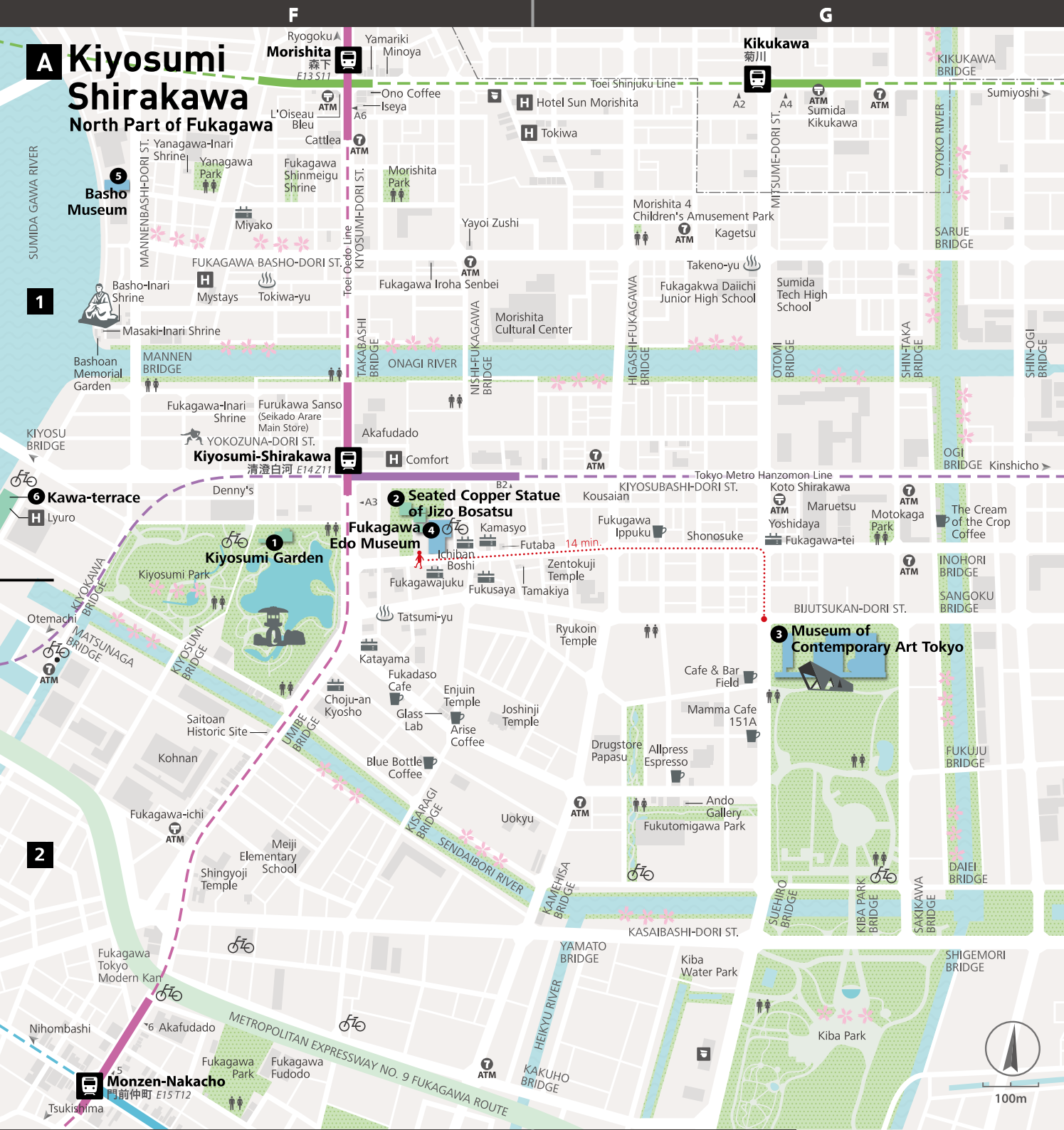

6 Japanese Boat Experience
Visitors can experience what it's like to ride on a Japanese boat, free of charge, at the seaside pier in Yokojikkengawa-shinsui Park. Same-day reservations are accepted (although prior reservations are required for groups). Check the website in advance as boats depart about once a week on a schedule that varies with the seasons.

1 Kiyosumi Garden
Kiyosumi Garden is designed in the same style as the Japanese gardens that were found in numerous daimyo residences during the Edo period. The beautiful scenery can be enjoyed while wandering through the garden at any time of the year. <http://www.tokyo-park.or.jp/park/format/index033.html>

2 Seated Copper Statue of Jizo Bosatsu
This seated copper statue of Jizo Bosatsu is one of six such statues originally located in Edo. Reiganji Temple's statue, the fifth of the series, was cast in 1717. The statue has been classified as a Designated Tangible Cultural Property by the Tokyo municipal government.

3 Museum of Contemporary Art Tokyo
MOT exhibits works representing a broad range of genres, including a permanent collection that offers an overview of the development of contemporary art and various large, international exhibits. <http://www.mot-art-museum.jp>



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The famous haiku poet Matsuo Basho lived in Fukagawa. Built on a site located close to his actual residence, the museum features exhibitions of historical materials related to Basho as well as representative examples of haiku authorship throughout the years. <http://www.kcf.or.jp/basyo/>

6 Come Enjoy the Waterside see map for details

Fukagawa-meshi cuisine
This local cuisine originated during the Edo period as a dish eaten by fishermen aboard their vessels. The Fukagawa Inn offers two varieties: bukkake, which consists of littleneck clams stewed in miso, and takikomi, a soy sauce-flavored variant.

B Monzen-Nakacho

1 Tomioka Hachimangu Shrine
Known for the Fukagawa Hachiman Festival, one of Edo's three great festivals, this Shrine is home to Japan's largest gold mikoshi (portable shrine) as well as a yokozuna monument (a historic sumo site). An antique fair is held on the second, fourth and fifth Sundays of every month. <http://www.tomiokahachimangu.or.jp/>

2 Fukagawa Fudodo
Fukagawa Fudodo, which houses a statue of the god of fire, has distinctive exterior walls that were designed based on the characters for "Shining", a Japanese school of Buddhism. A ceremony in which small pieces of wood are burned in prayer attracts many visitors. <http://fukagawafudodo.gr.jp>

3 Fukagawa Tokyo Modern Kan
Fukagawa Tokyo Modern Kan offers information about sightseeing, history, and culture in Koto City. The structure was built as a city-operated cafeteria in 1932, and is currently a nationally registered Tangible Cultural Property. <http://www.fukagawatokyo.com/>

4 Ninjo Fukagawa Goriyaku Dori St.
This street, which is the pilgrimage route to Fukagawa Fudodo, is home to about 40 shops (some more than 100 years old) offering Japanese-style confections and Edo-inspired articles. It is especially lively on the 1st, 15th and 28th of every month, when stall vendors also set up shop.

C Kameido

1 Kameido Tenjinsha Shrine
This shrine is dedicated to the deity Tenjin, the god of learning. It is one of the three great shrines in Koto City. The shrine is home to a large collection of historical documents and books. <http://www.kameido-tenjinsha.or.jp/>

2 Kameido Umeiyashiki
Kameido Umeiyashiki (Plum Estate) provides tourist information for Koto City and the Kameido district. The facility also has a gift shop that sells locally produced items and an area where Edo cut glass, an art form traditionally practised in the area, is on display and available for purchase. <https://kameido-umeyashiki.com>

3 Kameido Katori-jinja Shrine
Built in 665, Kameido Katori-jinja Shrine is Koto City's oldest Shinto shrine. Based on the fact that a general won a battle long ago after praying at this shrine, it is famous for being a place where prayers for success in martial arts and sports will be answered. <http://katori-jinja.jp/>

4 Bekko Isogai
This studio produces and sells detailed articles made from tortoise shells, a traditional art practised in Tokyo. A variety of items such as accessories and articles designed to be worn with kimono are available for purchase. <http://www.bekko-isogai.jp/>

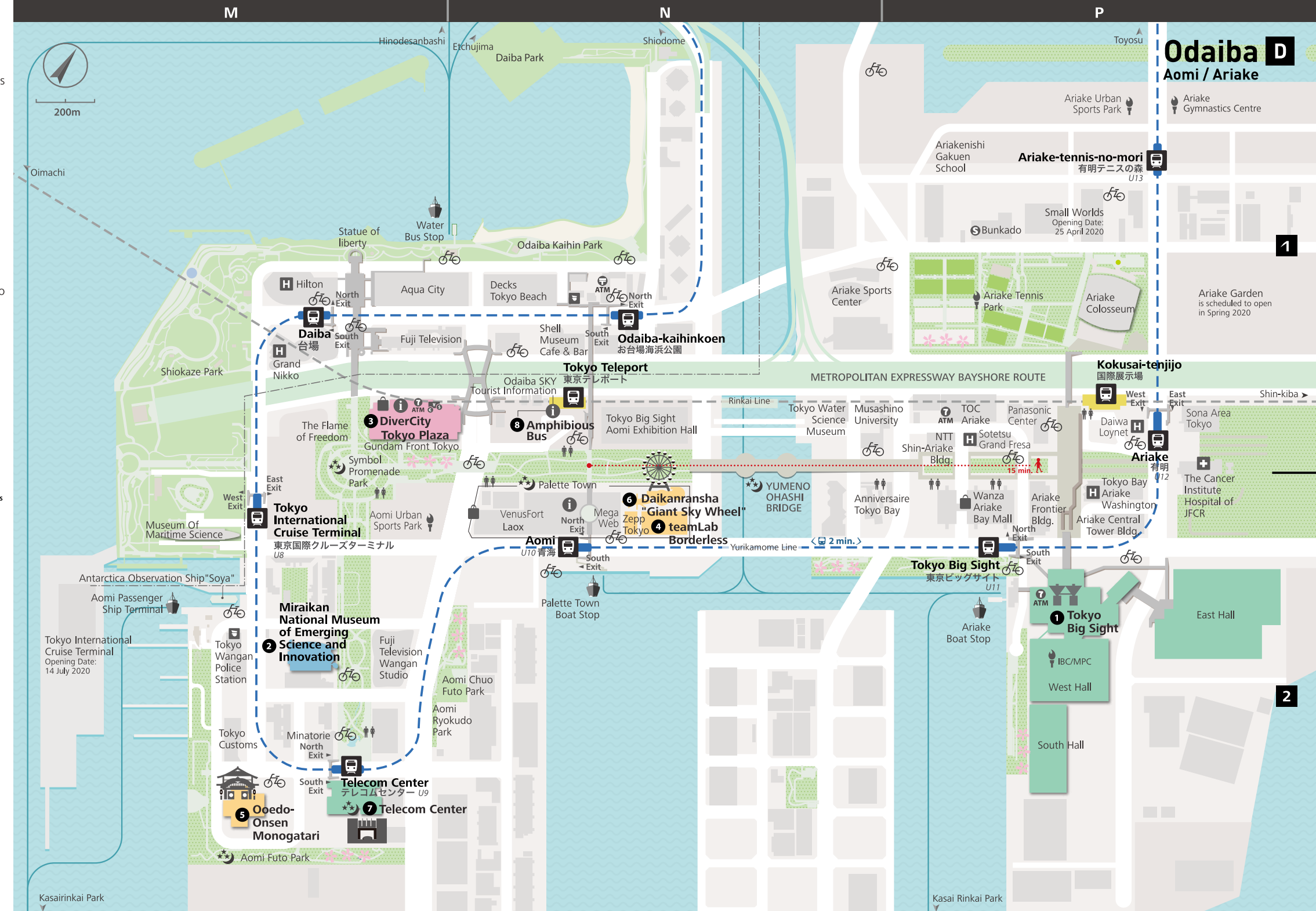
Edo Kiriko (Edo Cut Glass)
This traditional Japanese technique for working glass was invented in 1834. Beautiful glass articles and utensils featuring patterns such as lattices, flowers, and woven bamboo are used in many Japanese restaurants. *Image provider: Edokiriko Cooperative Association*

Traditional Foods
With numerous shops selling fare such as the Edo delicacy kuzumochi (confection made from wheat flour) and miso (soybean paste), this area offers visitors many opportunities to purchase foods that are representative of Japanese cuisine, which is a designated World Intangible Cultural Heritage.

1 Tokyo Big Sight
Japan's largest international exhibition hall, Big Sight hosts events that attract large numbers of attendees such as the biennial Tokyo Motor Show and the Japan International Machine Tool Fair, JIMTOF. <http://www.bigsight.jp/>

2 Miraikan National Museum of Emerging Science and Innovation

1 Gasute Nani Tokyo Gas Science Museum

2 Urban Dock Lalaport Toyosu
