Temple Garden of Philosophy


The Tetsugakudo Park (Temple Garden of Philosophy) is a park rich in nature located in the northern part of Nakano City with an area 1.2 times larger than Tokyo Dome. Enryo Inoue, a philosopher during the Meiji and Taisho eras, built the Temple of Philosophy as a place of philosophy and social education, and it is a truly unique park with few similar examples anywhere else in the world. The park is dotted with buildings and ponds that visually express the world of philosophy called the "77 features of the temple garden of philosophy."

It was designated as a place of beauty by the Tokyo Metropolitan Government in 2009, and by the Government of Japan in 2020.

The background of the construction of the Temple Garden of Philosophy

Enryo Inoue, the founder of Toyo University, established the Temple Garden of Philosophy in order to realize his ideas. Having built the garden for the "educational, moral, and philosophical cultivation of the spirit", Enryo sought to promote spiritual cultivation among the people through their exposure to the sages commemorated in the garden. Construction of the park began in 1903, and the very first structure, the Four Sages Hall, was completed in the following year. Confucius, Buddha, Socrates, and Kant are honored at this shrine.

After retiring from the university in 1906, Enryo concentrated on enhancing public morality through his Personal Cultivation Church Movement and through the expansion and management of the Four Sages Hall. Enryo tirelessly traveled across the country to give lectures. He used the money he earned on his nation-wide lecture tours and the money he earned from his calligraphy for the construction of his garden.

The four sages worshiped in the hall represent Eastern and Western philosophy. Confucius represents Chinese philosophy. Buddha represents Indian philosophy. Socrates represents ancient European philosophy, and Kant represents modern philosophy. The sages are represented by their names written on four wooden boards. "孔聖 (Confucius). 釈聖 (Buddha). 瑣聖 (Socrates). 韓聖 (Kant)".

Inexhaustible Treasury


Built as an exhibition area for the souvenirs that Enryo collected on his domestic and overseas travels. The upper floor is named Transcending Level while the ground floor is called Storehouse of the Myriad Phenomena.

Citadel of the Absolute

Formerly the library, it is named after Enryo's belief that it is possible to transcend all dualisms and reach the Absolute if one reads all the books in the world.



Pagoda of the Six Wise Ones

The landmark of the Garden. The Pagoda of the Six Wise Ones commemorates the sages of the oriental world, namely Japan. China, and India. The six wise ones are Prince Shotoku from ancient Japan, Sugawara no Michizane from medieval Japan, Zhuangzi and Zhu Xi from the Chinese Zhou and Song Dynasties respectively. Nagarjuna from the Buddhist world of India, and Kapila from the Brahmin philosophy of India.



The Gate of Philosophical Reason, the main entrance of the Temple Garden of Philosophy

The main entrance of the Temple Garden of Philosophy. The statues of a tengu and a ghost placed inside both pillars of the gate symbolize the mystery of the material world and the mystery of the spiritual world respectively. These indicate that "the rationality of the irrational" (i.e. the incomprehensible) lies at the root of both matter and spirit.

Statue of Tengu and Statue of Ghost

As written above, there are two statues on both sides of the aisle. The Statue of Tengu is inside the right pillar, while the Statue of Ghost is inside the left. These statues symbolizing "the rationality of the irrational" are magnificent pieces that bring about sentiments of fear and awe to people even today. All visitors should take a look at the two statues in the dark.

The Statue of Tengu and Statue of Ghost are replicas recreated with

the samefeatures such as the original colors.
The Statue of Tengu and Statue of Ghost which had been on display up until

now were relocated to the Yamazaki Memorial Nakano Historical and Folklore Museum.

The truth lies in philosophy The life of Enryo Inoue, dedicated to the construction of the Temple Garden of Philosophy

Life of Enryo Inoue

Born in 1858 to a Buddhist priest in Nagaoka City, Niigata Prefecture. Sent to Tokyo in 1878 as a scholar of Higashi-honganji temple, admitted to the preparatory course of Tokyo University, admitted in 1881 as a pioneer student to the philosophy department of Tokyo University's faculty of letters. Established the Philosophy Society in 1884, founded the Philosophy Academy (present day Toyo University) in 1887 upon graduation from Tokyo University. Retired from the university in 1906 and dedicated the rest of his life to expanding the Temple Garden of Philosophy and traveling across the country to conduct lectures in order to spread philosophy. Died in 1919 at the age of 61.

Awakening to philosophy and the establishment of the Philosophy Society

Enryo began manifesting interest in philosophy, which was born in Greece and subsequently nurtured in Western civilizations, while studying at Tokyo University. After studying Western philosophy, Enryo then reviewed his own religion and discovered that Buddhism was an "Oriental philosophy" with thousands of years of history. After conferring with his teachers and student colleagues, Enryo established the Philosophy Society in 1884. Becoming himself a core member of the society, Enryo went on to publish the "Journal of the Philosophy Society", in which he asserted that "philosophy is the study of logic and the investigation of the rules of thought and the principles of things. Therefore, there is nothing concerning thought or existence that is not related to philosophy." Moreover, he also makes the case that "the basis of all learning lies in philosophy." "The research and propagation of philosophy is absolutely necessary for the development of the civilization of society and the state." "In addition to Western philosophy, the academic pursuit of Oriental philosophy is necessary."

From the Philosophy Academy to Toyo University

"The basis of all learning lies in philosophy" is the educational principle upon which Enryo established the Testugaku-kan, or Philosophy Academy when he was 29, in order to spread philosophy to those who did not have the financial means to attend the university and those who did not have the time or capacity to study books in English. Receiving help and advice from Kaishu Katsu, Enryo left for Europe in 1888, the following year, in order to broaden his knowledge and views. In June of 1906, the Philosophy Academy, which had acquired the status of a private university in 1904, changed its name to "Toyo University," i.e. Oriental University. This bears testimony to Enryo's strong desire, after becoming acquainted with Western philosophy, to build a independent university of philosophy in the East.

Construction of the Temple Garden of Philosophy

In "My Philosophical Mission" written in 1919, Enryo writes about his two goals of the popularization and realization of philosophy. The popularization of philosophy during his early period lies in writing, educational activities, and the establishment of the Philosophy Academy. His nation-wide lecture tours and the establishment of the Temple Garden of Philosophy are central to the realization of philosophy. The Four Sages Hall was built in 1902 on land that was initially purchased as a new university campus of the Philosophy Academy. Built for the "spiritual cultivation of people through educational, moral, and philosophical means", the idea of this park is to nurture people's spirits through exposure to the sages honored there.

Establishment of Mystery Studies (Yokai-gaku)

There are many inexplicably mysterious phenomena in our daily lives. People during the Meiji era, according to tradition, believed that these were all "yokai" (supernatural spirits, monsters, demons etc.). Enryo was a leading researcher of "mysterious phenomena". Due to his keen interest in mysterious phenomena since his student days at Tokyo University, Enryo founded the Enigma Research Society upon graduation. He studied a wide range of anomalies including "kokkuri" (a Japanese equivalent of table-turning popular in Japan at the time) as well as various mental illnesses. He also gathered a broad range of documents and materials related to vokais. The "Lectures on Mystery Studies" is the fruit of Enryo's research into anomalies over a period of ten years. Enryo's investigations into yokais won praises in Japan, where superstition was widespread. His "Lectures on Mystery Studies" were presented to Emperor Meiji through the Minister of Imperial Household.

World Travels and Collection

Enryo made many study trips in Japan and all over the world. He went for a total of three world travels during his lifetime, when he was 30, 44, and 53, and he traveled for a total of 29 months. Enryo's visit to the Paris World's Fair and his studies about the Western university and social education system

deepened his understanding of modernization. It also provided him with a background of knowledge about nations, societies, religions, and educational systems of the world, which convinced him even more of Japan's uniqueness. The rare items Enryo collected on his travels are preserved and are still on display today.

These are believed to have been acquired in South Africa. Enryo saw a picture of indigenous people smoking when he stopped in Durban before passing the Cape of Good Hope. He recorded his impression upon seeing the picture: "They smoke it as though they are nibbling on a radish."

The round-shaped stone placed on top of the rectangular curb is an illustration of Enryo Inoue's name, which literally means "Roundness upon the Well."

After opening the Four Sages Hall in 1904, Enryo Inoue published the "The Guide to Temple Garden of Philosophy" in 1915. when construction of the current garden was almost completed. By setting up 77 philosophical features in the garden, Enryo wished to express a philosophical worldview that could be grasped by walking through the park.

Skull Hermitage

Situated in close proximity to the Gate of Common Sense, the Skull Hermitage is an expression not of physical death, but of spiritual death. Here, visitors clean their minds from worldly defilements. After that, they pass through a corridor known as the Corridor of Resurrection and proceed to the Hollow of Gods and Demons.



Garden of Idealism

This part of the Garden represents the idealistic world view which searches the root of all things in the mind. The Garden of Idealism is the antithesis of the Garden of Materialism.

Formerly the library, this was the place where the records of those who tirelessly pursued the path to the truth are kept.



Gate of the Irrational

Your walk ends at the Gate of the Irrational, which lies beside the Citadel of the Absolute. Through this Gate, you return to the arbitrariness of your daily life. Putting to practice what you have learned in the Temple Garden of Philosophy is indeed the real path of philosophy.



Temple Garden of Philosophy (Tetsugaku-do Park)

The gorgeous Garden of Philosophy facing Nakano Dori Street features different flowers depending on the season. Admire the statues of the world's philosophers, created by the Hungarian sculptor Nandor Wagner. From here, cross the blue bridge over Myoushougawa River and on towards the Temple Garden of Philosophy (Tetsugaku-do Park).

Don't miss "Shinetsusen" near Araivakushi-mae Station. which features an entrance built from glass blocks and baths located underground. Although it is a bit hard to find, tucked down a side street off the main shopping street, this public bath has continued operating through 3 generations and uses soft well water in its 5-17-2 Arai, Nakano-ku / TEL 03-3386-4917 bathing tubs.

The well-fed Nakano Kotobukiyu Hot Spring was recognized as a natural hot spring in March 2013, and became the first hot spring in Nakano Ward. Hot water containing metasilicic acid has properties that lock in moisture, and have a beautifying effect on the skin. Because "bathing kits" are available for purchase, you can show up empty-handed and still enjoy the notable hot springs in Nakano

Yakushi-no-Oban

Yakushi-no-Oban opened more than 35 years ago in front of the Araiyakushi-mae station, Operating in Nakano, which is a very competitive area for ramen, a popular menu item is the Ramen Kotemaru beloved by the locals. It uses back fat for a strong flavor, but it has a clean aftertaste. The soup is served with delicious noodles of

medium thickness. The ramen is also subject to the Furusato Nozei Program in Nakano.

Baishoin (Araiyakushi)

This ancient temple in Tokyo is well-known as a temple said to have the power to cure eye ailments and help with raising children. It is listed as the 71st temple of the 88 holy sites in Tokyo. The principal image is the amalgamation of two Buddhas: Cintamanicakra (Nyoirin-kannon in Japanese) and Bhaisajyaguru (Yakushinyorai in Japanese). This is a very rare principal image even within Japan. The "Onegai Jizo" (a statue of the Guardian Deity of Travelers and Children that grants wishes) is also well-known. There are also many good luck charms available for purchase.

This historic butcher established in 1934 purchases whole cows and pigs and uses special techniques from deboning to dressed meat making it popular in Nakano among meat lovers. There is a complete lineup of A5 rank beef including Matsuzaka Beef. The shop is popular morning to night as it also offers food products, side dishes and more.

Yakushi Ai Road Shopping Street MAP D-6

A T-shaped shopping street that extends from Waseda Street to the vicinity of Arai Yakushi Baishoin. Among the shops with a mid 20th century vibe such as yakitori shops, senbei cracker shops, tailors and public baths, there are also stylish cafes and variety shops.

The Nakano Sun Mall Shopping Street and surrounding shopping district

On the 224-meter shopping street that leads to Nakano Broadway, there are over 100 shops, including restaurants, clothing and drug stores. Although it appears to be an ordinary shopping street at first glance, it has various hidden enhancements such as marble pavement, large chandeliers, and sound equipment that allows you to enjoy a hree-dimensional sound experience. Events such as the "Aerial Gallery", which displays large paintings done by junior high school students from Nakano Ward. are also familiar to residents.



Arriving at your destination, the Temple Garden of Philosophy! Turn right from the Shin-Ome Highway and you will see the entrance to the Temple Garden of Philosophy. Visit 77 sites scattered throughout the park, such as Rokkendai featured in the photo.



Renge Temple MAP G-1

A Nichiren-school Buddhist temple located next to the Temple of Philosophy which contains the grave of Inoue Enryou, the founder of the Temple of Philosophy. In the always beautifully maintained temple grounds, visitors can enjoy cherry blossoms in the spring and the changing colors of the leaves in autumn. Nature is so abundant here that it is hard to believe you are still in the Tokyo metropolitan area.




Shopping area around Numabukuro Station

noodles to be served, many people drink sake with appetizers - 400 yen for the proprietress's pickles.




Hyaku Kannon · Meiji Temple




