




## Delicacies





## Tokyo Station

Both the Tokyo Station Marunouchi Building, an Important Cultural Property of Japan, and the plaza in front of Marunouchi Exit that opened in 2017 are must-sees. This neighborhood has a high concentration of shopping centers where you'll find luxury brand shops, general merchandise shops and fine restaurants, such as Marunouchi Bldg., Shin-Marunouchi Bldg., and JP Tower KITTE.



## Nihombashi

Nihombashi Bridge was built in 1603 when the Edo Bakufu, or Japan's last feudal government, was established. The current twin-arch stone bridge built in 1911 has posts decorated with bronze dragons and lions. The bridge was the starting point of the Five Routes in the Edo period and is still considered the starting point of national highways. The Kilometer Zero marker can be found at the center of the bridge.



A 333m broadcasting tower built in 1958. It has a 250m Top Deck and a 150m Main Deck with a glass floor and other facilities. TOKYO ONE PIECE TOWER in Foot Town, a theme park for the anime "ONE PIECE", is popular with visitors.

## Asakusa

Asakusa is where traces of Edo culture survive. It is home to Sensoji Temple, the oldest temple in Tokyo built over 1,300 years ago, as well as local established food and souvenir shops. Various seasonal events attract many people, such as Hatsumode (first temple visit of the year), Sanja Matsuri Festival, Hozuki (Chinese lantern plant) Market, Hagoita Paddle Market and the Tori no Ichi (open-air market).

## Ameyoko

Beginning as a black market after World War II, this shopping street is lined with over 400 reasonable shops stretching from Ueno Station to beneath the JR train tracks in Okachimachi Station. ### Indulge in a magnificent experience in the forest of art Museum Walk in Ueno

Ueno Onshi Park is one of the best spots for art in Tokyo. It has a cluster of cultural facilities that stimulate your intellectual curiosity, such as Tokyo National Museum that houses the largest collection in Japan, National Museum of Nature and Science that introduces natural history and the history of science and technology and the National Museum of Western Art that has a diverse collection of well-known Western art.



At this market dedicated to fishery, fresh fish accounts for about 40% of its products, while frozen fish and salted and dried processed fish about 60%. Anyone can access the retail market selling products such as dried bonito, meat, fruits and vegetables, and also the cafeteria. The wholesale market is open for viewing. On Adachi Market Day (2nd Saturday of odd number months [exceptions apply; 3rd Saturday in January only]), the public can also make purchases at the wholesale market.





## Shrine in the heart of Tokyo where visitors pray for safe childbirth and child rearing Ohmiya Hachimangu

This shrine enshrines Emperor Ojin and his parents and attracts followers who pray for matchmaking, safe childbirth and child rearing. As it is located in the heart of Tokyo, it is also known as the “navel of Tokyo: child rearing protector shrine.” Its large premises spanning nearly 50,000m<sup>2</sup> are filled with greenery and feature beautiful seasonal flowers, such as cherry blossoms in the spring and chrysanthemums in the autumn.

## A memorial to the stray dog protection center established in the late 17th century Dog Statues in Nakano

Under the “Edicts on Compassion for Living Things” issued by Tokugawa Tsunayoshi, the fifth shogun of the Tokugawa shogunate, a stray dog protection center of the government was established in Nakano in 1695 and existed for 15 years. It is said that anywhere between tens of thousands to 300,000 dogs were kept at the center that was approximately 990,000m<sup>2</sup> in area. Dog statues have been installed in front of the Nakano City Office to remember this history.

Yoshida Shoin (1830-1859) is an intellectual in the end of the Tokugawa shogunate known for his school Shoka Sonjuku in Hagi, Yamaguchi Prefecture. He was only 30 years old when he was executed in Tenmachi in Edo due to the Ansei Purge. Yoshida was reburied here thanks to his students Shinsaku Takasugi, Hirobumi Ito and others. The shrine was built in 1882.





There has been redevelopment in the zone between the Inari Bridge and Shin-Namiki Bridge along the Shibuya River on the south side of Shibuya Station. A boardwalk with plenty of greenery and a river wall "water fountain" were built. In September 2018, commercial complexes Shibuya Stream and Shibuya Bridge opened, making the area a hub of creative people.







Enkiri Enoki, meaning hackberry that breaks bonds, has been one of the most well known spots in Itabashi since the Edo period and is located on the corner of a shopping street along Kyu-Nakasendo road. The tree has been worshipped for severing evil bonds and tying good bonds. Many ema (wooden tablets) are dedicated to the deity at Enoki Inari Shrine where the tree is planted. In Edogawa City, a place where goldfish have been reared continuously since the Edo period, there are spot sales of goldfish and a goldfish scooping tournament, etc.

#### Sumida River Fireworks Festival (Taito City, Sumida City) ④

**Dates** last Saturday in July (in 2020 to be held on July 11)

**Venues** downstream of Sakurabashi bridge–upstream of Kototoibashi bridge (First Venue), downstream of Komagatabashi bridge–upstream of Umayabashi bridge (Second Venue)

### August

This is a big event in which approximately 10,000 fireworks decorate the night sky. The venue requiring an entrance fee has live performances by splendid artists.

#### Koenji Awa-odori Dance (Suginami City)

**Dates** late August **Venues** around JR Koenji Sta. and Subway Shin-Koenji Sta.  
It is an Awa-odori dance parade that started in 1957 and is viewed by nearly one million people every year.

#### The Harajuku Omotesando Genki-matsuri Festival — Super Yosakoi (Shibuya City)

**Dates** late August (in 2020 to be held early October) **Venues** around Harajuku and Omotesando

It combines Kochi, the home of Yosakoi, and Harajuku/Omotesando. More than 100 teams give public performances of dances.



## September

### Fukuro Matsuri (Ikebukuro Festival) (Toshima City)

**Dates** late September (first half), early October (second half) **Venues** in front of the west exit of Ikebukuro Sta., Ikebukuro West Exit Park, and others

It is held in two parts, the magnificent mikoshi festival in September and the dance festival in October.

### Shinagawa Shukuba Festival (Shinagawa City)

**Dates** last Saturday and Sunday in September

**Venues** Kyu-Tokaido (around Kita-shinagawa–Minami-shinagawa) At the Shinagawa inn, the post station of the Tokaido, there are an abundance of events including a procession of glamorous oiran courtesans, a procession of people in Edo period costumes, and more!

## October

### Yanaka Festival (Taito City)

**Dates** early October **Venues** Yanaka Area (emergency evacuation point “Hatsune no Mori” and others)

A broad variety of events including stage events and stamp rally, etc. are held against the backdrop of a town that retains the feel of the Shitamachi old town area.

### Jiyugaoka Goddess Festival (Meguro City)

**Dates** early October **Venues** in front of Jiyugaoka Sta.

This is a popular event, which has continued for over 40 years, in which the attractiveness of the town can be experienced. Live performances by popular artists are also presented.

### Ikegami Honmonji Temple Oeshiki (Ota City)

**Dates** October 11–13 **Venues** Ikegami Honmonji Temple Approximately 300,000 worshippers visit from all around the country for the October 12 Mando Lantern Parade.

### Nihonbashi Ebisu-ko Bettara-ichi Pickle Fair (Chuo City)

**Dates** October 19 and 20 **Venues** Takarada Ebisu Shrine and its vicinity

A market for decorated bamboo rakes for wishing for good luck and

commercial prosperity is set up, and in addition there are performances in the famous show tents.

### Rikugien Gardens: illumination of the autumn leaves and the daimyo garden (Bunkyo City) ⑤

**Dates** mid-November–early December

**Venues** Rikugien Gardens

The autumn leaves of the strolling-type garden with an artificial hill and large lake built in 1702 are illuminated and look magical.

### Jingu Gaien Ginkgo Festival (Minato City)

**Dates** late November–early December

**Venues** Meijijingu Gaien

Stalls offering gourmet food and booths selling specialty goods are lined up in rows at the end of the approximately 300m-long ginkgo-lined avenue.

## December

### Blue Cave SHIBUYA (Shibuya City) ⑥

**Dates** late November–the end of December (Shibuya Koen-dori until mid-January) **Venues** Yoyogi Park, Shibuya Koen-dori The approximately 800m from the Yoyogi Park zelkova-lined avenue to the Shibuya Koen-dori is illuminated with a blue color.

### Setagaya Boro-ichi (Fair) (Setagaya City)

**Dates** December 15 and 16 (also held on January 15 and 16)

**Venues** “Boro-ichi-dori” (1-chome, Setagaya) and its vicinity It is a historical fair which has its origins in the Azuchi–Momoyama period. There are more than 700 stalls lined up and they are thronged with crowds of people.

### Oji Kitsune-no-gyoretsu Fox Parade (Kita City)

**Dates** December 31–January 1 **Venues** Shozoku Inari Shrine, Oji Inari Shrine

This is a magical festival inheriting an ancient tradition, in which a parade of people dressed as foxes carries out the first shrine visit of the year from the evening of New Year’s Eve.

### Joya no Kane (Arai Yakushi Baishoin Temple) (Nakano City)

**Dates** December 31–January 1 **Venues** Arai Yakushi Baishoin Temple

This is a temple that is familiar as the temple of the Buddha that heals eyes. Visitors can ring the New Year’s bell (Joya no Kane) here.

## January

### First shrine visit of the year (Meiji Jingu) (Shibuya City)

**Dates** shrine visiting hours are extended December 31–January 4 **Venues** Meiji Jingu

More than three million people make their first shrine visit of the year here over three days. The shrine can be visited all night long on New Year’s Eve and New Year’s Day.

### Minato City World Festival (Minato City)

**Dates** mid-January–late March

**Venues** locations throughout Minato City

In Minato City, which has the largest number of embassies in Japan, visitors can experience the charms of various countries.

### Nishiara Daishi Daruma Market (Adachi City)

**Dates** January 21 **Venues** Nishiara Daishi Temple

A daruma market is established inside the temple grounds on “Hatsudaishi” in January, which is the luckiest of the fair days on the 21st day of every month.

The shrine is decorated with nearly 3,000 hina dolls that are dedicated, together with brilliantly blooming red and white peach blossom offerings from the premises.

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





# Industrial Clusters of the Tokyo 23 Cities

The Tokyo 23 cities are home to many industrial clusters that exploit the unique strengths of each area, including the history, culture, local resources and geographical characteristics. The presence of companies and people in the same area has given rise to interchange, cooperation and communities, which are continuing to develop as the hubs of local industry and commerce.

● Supporting Japan's manufacturing industries with advanced technology

## M anufacturing Industry



The Tokyo 23 cities are home to various manufacturing industries. Sumida City is known as a manufacturing hub, and there are many manufacturers in fields ranging from the textile industry to metals and machinery there. In Taito City, highly fashionable products are manufactured, including shoes, bags and belts. In addition, Shinagawa City, which is considered the birthplace of the Keihin industrial region, has long been home to industrial clusters that boast advanced technological strength in the electronics and machinery fields. In Ota City, there are a striking number of companies with advanced technological strength in terms of machinery, metal, and other processing, as well as a cluster of small-scale companies involved in general tools and machinery, metal/plastic products, and similar businesses. Itabashi City saw a shift to peace-time industries for its precision and optical instruments after the war, and industrial clusters formed there due to printing-related industries and other businesses moving there from the heart of the city. Even compared to the rest of Tokyo, the City is a thriving industrial hub. Finally, both Adachi City and Katsushika City are home to many small-scale manufacturers, which has resulted in the formation of a local-industry-oriented society.



## E ntertainment District



Kabukicho, Shinjuku City and Roppongi, Minato City are Japan's leading entertainment districts. There are various styles of restaurants, entertainment facilities and other attractions here, and these areas are popular among travelers from both Japan and abroad. In addition, multiple railway lines run through Ikebukuro, Toshima City, and a lot of passengers use the station, so the area around the station in particular is always bustling.

## E lectric Town



Electric Town, which is centered on Akihabara, was formed as a result of people transporting military communication equipment from Chiba and then setting up stalls to sell it to students of Denki School (currently Tokyo Denki University), which led to the appearance of major consumer electronics stores. Although there was a time when the area temporarily lost momentum to suburban electronics stores, Electric Town has changed with the times with the opening of stores, including anime, game and cosplay stores, and the area is a bustling industrial-cluster location.

## A gricultural Industry



Within the Tokyo 23 cities, Nerima City has the most expansive farmland area, followed by Setagaya City. Urban agriculture, which is designed to harmonize with the lifestyle of the City residents, is pursued in both Cities. The main business approach is *local production for local consumption*, which involves small-scale farmers producing small amounts of many products and then directly selling them on their own or selling them through JA (Japan Agricultural Cooperative) communal stores. Traditional vegetables such as Nerima daikon as well as other locally gathered vegetables are branded and sold.

Part of Meguro-dori, a place commonly known as Interior-dori, is home to many shops that sell finely designed furniture and is loved as a stylish industrial cluster. In addition, there are many secondhand clothing stores in Koenji, Sugunami City, and there are antique shops here and there in Nishiogikubo, Sugunami City. As a result of soldiers who once lived in the Nishiogikubo area giving up their large mansions, a lot of furniture they no longer needed ended up in the market, which is said to be a factor that enticed antique dealers.

# Visiting Sites Associated with Eiichi Shibusawa

To bolster Japan's national strength and enhance trade following the Meiji Restoration, an organization was needed that oversees the overall improvement and development of commerce and industry and that represents their opinion. Against this background, the Tokyo Chamber of Commerce was established in 1878. Its first chairman was Eiichi Shibusawa. Check out these sites associated with Shibusawa, who laid the foundation of Japan's modern economy.

The NHK taiga drama for 2021 will depict the life of Eiichi Shibusawa. His portrait will also be printed on the new 10,000 yen banknote to be issued from 2024.


### Shibusawa Memorial Museum

Shibusawa Memorial Museum tells the life and achievements of Eiichi Shibusawa. It is located on the site of the former residence of Shibusawa and is surrounded by the greenery of Asukayama Park. The Main Building has an exhibition space and reading corner with a collection and displays of many materials. The Museum preserves, opens to the public and utilizes the Bankoro Cottage and the Seien Bunko Library (both designated as Important Cultural Properties by the government).

### Bankoro Cottage

The Bankoro is a Western and Japanese cottage built in 1917 by Shimizu Gumi to celebrate Shibusawa's 77th birthday. It encapsulates the architectural beauty of that time, with the use of durable chestnut materials and attention paid to details, such as furniture, furnishings and ceiling reliefs.



### Seien Bunko Library

This library was built in 1925 in celebration of Shibusawa's 80th birthday and his promotion from baron to viscount and was used to entertain guests. "Seien" is Shibusawa's pen name. The building has beautiful stained glass windows featuring a design of oak leaf, the family crest.

# Public Etiquette

Know basic etiquette and rules to make your stay in Japan enjoyable and pleasant.

## ◆ Visiting Shrines and Temples

Both shrines and temples where you can experience Japanese traditional culture are sacred places. There is a unique Japanese way to visit a shrine or temple.

### Shrine

A place enshrining kami (deities) worshipped by Japanese people since ancient times. There is always a torii gate at the entrance, and all areas beyond the torii gate are considered sacred.



- 1 Bow once and enter through the torii gate



- 2 Rinse your hands and mouth at the purification font



\*After bowing slightly once in front of the shrine building, ring the bell and make a monetary offering. Bow deeply twice, put your palms together and clap your hands twice at the height of your chest. Bow slightly one more time.

- 3 At the shrine building, bow twice, clap your hands twice, and bow once

### Temple

Temples are a place for Buddhist training, and many manage cemeteries. There is a magnificent sanmon gate at the entrance, and a buddha or bodhisattva statue is enshrined in the temple building.



- 1 Bow once and enter through the sanmon gate



- 2 Place incense sticks in the incense burner (if there is one) and purify yourself with the smoke



\*If there is a purification font, rinse your hands and mouth.



- 3 Gassho (put your palms together) in front of the temple building

## ◆ Bathing at Japanese Hot Springs and Public Baths

Soaking in a large bath at a hot spring or sento (public bath) with many people is a cultural experience. It is important to show consideration for others.



- 1 Pour hot water on yourself before soaking



- 2 Do not put your towel or hair in the bath water



- 3 When showering, make sure you do not spray the person next to you

- 4 No bathing in swimsuit or underwear


