Area Kabukicho

Kabukicho was established in 1948 as part of World War II damage reconstruction. The name came from a plan to attract a Kabuki theater in the area, although it was not materialized, it helped bring a wave of other entertainment complexes to Kabuki-cho. Theaters, movie theaters, restaurants, bars were constructed one after the other, and soon Kabuki-cho had become the largest entertainment district in Japan. Safe and enjoyable town planning has been promoted and the area attracts many



TOKYU KABUKICHO TOWER

A high-rise building complex with 48 floors above ground and 5 floors below ground, which houses hotels, a cinema, and a theatre among various facilities. The basement floor is home to Zepp Shinjuku(TOKYO), the live music hall with the largest capacity in the Shinjuku area. A digital display and an outdoor stage are set up on the east side of the complex and are sometimes used together with the adjacent Cine City Square.

6 Godzilla head (Shinjuku Toho Building)

The Godzilla head is at the 8th floor terrace of the Shinjuku Toho Building, which was opened at the site of the former Shiniuku Koma Stadium. It is roughly 50 meters-high, which is the same as the height of the Godzilla in the first Godzilla movie



1-19-1 Kabukicho, Shinjuku-ku5 minutes on foot from the Shinjuku station east exit (JR line), 3 minutes on foot from Seibu Shinjuku station (Seibu line)



Built in 1946, Suehirotei is an esteemed rakugo (traditional comic storytelling) and iromono (various entertainments other than storytelling) theater that has held regular performances dating back to the Edo period (1603-1868). Made of wood, this distinguished looking building has both Japanese tatami seats and chairs available for the audience (City-designated cultural asset). The show changes its performers and programs every 10 days, and holds late night shows performed by young comic story tellers every Saturday night.

8 Hanazono-jinja Shrine

The astonishing vermillion Hanazono-jinja shrine houses the guardian deity of Shinjuku. Hanazono-jinja is a popular tourist spot, and is well-loved by locals who use it to escape from the bustle of Shinjuku and relax. The Aozora-Kotto-Ichi (open-air antique flea market) is held here every Sunday (canceled for rain). In November, you can visit the Tori-no-lchi market, where stalls selling rakes (to businesses, in order to "rake in" prosperity) and even a freak show can be found.





Tokvo Metropolitan Government Building

The Tokyo Metropolitan Government Building was designed by the architect Tange Kenzo, and completed in 1991. The observation deck (free admission) on the 45th floor of Main Building No. 1 offers a 202-meter-high panoramic view of Tokyo, and the onsite restaurants, cafes, and employee cafeterias are all open to the public Visit at night for cool projection mapping displays.

Shinjuku Gyoen National Garden is a large, well-known park ir Shinjuku that blends Western and Japanese style gardens. Besides the tea house and restaurant, the park also contains buildings related to the Imperial household. In spring it is a popular location for viewing cherry blossoms, in fall people gather to see the autumn colors, and in November it hosts an exquisite chrysanthemum exhibit.

3 Juniso Kumano-jinja Shrine

This shrine, built in the Muromachi Period (1336-1573). houses the local deity of the Tsunohazu region (modern day Kabukicho and Nishi-shinjuku). Here you will find the "Junisounohi" monument, the "Shichi-nin Yakusha-zu-ema(votive picture of horse)" and the "Shiki-sanban hounougaku(votive tablet)", which are votive tablets donated to the shrine from kabuki actors. You can also see a saucer with inscriptions from the famed kyouka (comic tanka) composer Ota Nampo (Shokusaniin), and other cultural treasures.

Shinjuku Chuo Park

An 80 thousand square-meter lush green park next to the skyscrapers of western Shinjuku. It includes a grassy field, a forest for ward residents, a water park where flea markets are held, and a multipurpose athletic field with a running track. The exchange facility SHUKNOVA here has restaurants and a fitness club and offers various programs where visitors can engage in both indoor and outdoor activities such as bouldering and voga as well as enjoy food and tea in a comfortable atmosphere with a woody aroma.
